# Season for Change announces an open call for four £10,000 commissions for UK-based artists underrepresented in climate conversations.

Season for Change, led by Julie's Bicycle and Artsadmin, is launching 'Common Ground', a programme of four £10,000 commissions and an accompanying professional development programme for UK-based artists, makers or creators. Common Ground focuses on creative climate leadership, justice and equitable participation within the climate movement.

Season for Change is a nationwide programme of artistic and cultural events that celebrate the environment and inspire urgent climate action. Throughout 2020, Season for Change will build towards a live programme of creative work and amplified campaign in spring 2021.

The climate movement is urgent and essential – however, it has not always been representative of those most affected by the impacts of environmental change. In order to challenge existing imbalances in the climate movement, Common Ground will commission four UK-based artists to work with communities and groups of their choice that are underrepresented in climate movements. Common Ground invites applications from artists who identify as Black, Asian and minority ethnic/POC, refugee, D/deaf, disabled, neurodivergent, working class and/or LGBTQI+, however will not expect or require them to explore their identity in relation to these groups through the commission. The programme will support artists who may not have responded directly to environmental concerns before, but have a clear sense of the people, communities and environmental challenges they want to work with.

Common Ground will run from September 2020 to April 2021. The commission offer for UK-based artists, makers or creators working across all art forms includes:

- A cash award of £10,000 to support the creation of a new, participatory work;
- Artist development programme to develop artistic practice and leadership within the climate movement;
- Advocacy and marketing support through Season for Change's and partners' websites and social media;
- Support for access requirements.











The **Common Ground Artist Development Programme**, which sits alongside the commissions, will:

- Connect the commissioned artists to one another to share and develop their practice through peer-to-peer knowledge sharing, individual and group coaching and creative mentoring;
- Deliver environmental leadership training to support the sustainability of their practice and presence within the wider creative climate movement;
- Provide bespoke professional development that empowers them with skills, knowledge and opportunities to raise the voice of the communities they work with in the mainstream environmental movement and achieve impact, through facilitated workshops, coaching, group work, peer learning, and guest speakers.

The four new commissioned works will be showcased as part of Season for Change's nationwide programme, which also includes:

- 10 participatory commissions with partners nationwide that engage diverse audiences with the climate crisis;
- Free online events and resources to empower artists and cultural organisations to take action and inspire their audiences and communities;
- A national campaign of events about climate change and the environment involving over 250 artists and arts organisations across the UK.

#### **Application process**

The deadline for applications is 10am on Thursday 30 July 2020, and selection will be complete by the end of August 2020.

Season for Change will be hosting two online briefings on Thursday 25 June at 3pm and Tuesday 7 July at 11am for applicants to find out more about the Common Ground commissions, meet the Season for Change team and ask questions about applying.

In November 2020, the UK had planned to welcome over 170 countries for COP26, the UN's climate negotiations to discuss the Paris Agreement: the most important international agreement on the climate crisis. In light of Covid-19, COP26 has been delayed until November 2021 – but our plans for Season for Change are pressing ahead with a new timeline and a programme co-curated with over 30 partners.

Throughout 2020, Season for Change will continue to build towards a live programme of creative work and amplified campaign in spring 2021. Season for Change will showcase the creativity and leadership of the UK's cultural sector on the most important issue of our time. In the uncertainty of this current moment, we are certain of one thing: arts and culture can still mobilise people to act for climate justice.

Season for Change is led by Artsadmin and Julie's Bicycle, delivered in collaboration with over 30 partners and supported by Arts Council England and the Paul Hamlyn Foundation.
